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

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- I3= the # of REBELLION (14:9; Deu 1:26) cf. (Gen 13; Rev 13)
- The Lord told Moses to SEND men into the land (one from each of the 12 tribes) and to SEARCH the LAND (13:2)- NOTHING more
- > The name SETHUR (13:13) adds up to 666 in Hebrew
- Moses ADDS to the word of God by telling the spies to search two things the Lord never said to: (1) the PEOPLE (whether they are strong or weak, few or many); and (2) the CITIES (whether they are tents or strong holds)
- There was also no need to see if the land was "good or bad" because the Lord had already told them it was GOOD (Exo 3:8)
- The first appearance of ANAK(IM) (13:22) (appears 18x = 6+6+6)
- Anak, his three sons, and his father Arbah (Jos 15:13), of whom Hebron was originally named after (i.e.- Kirjath-Arbah) (Jud 1:10), were GIANTS (13:33)
- Eschol= "cluster"; one CLUSTER of grapes had to be borne between two men on a staff (13:23), for this to be necessary, the grapes must have been the size of a GRAPEFRUIT!



- The spies report of the land was that it was a land flowing with milk and honey (13:27)- just like the Lord said (Exo 13:8); and the huge cluster of grapes was the evidence of this fact
- NEVERTHELESS= there is no "nevertheless" when God has promised, even if circumstances appear to contradict the promise
- The evil report of the land was based on the PEOPLE and the CITIES (13:28), the two things Moses added to the Lord's scouting report
- The news must have caused an uproar among the people since Caleb had to still them (13:30)- the uproar may have been, "the Lord didn't tell us there were GIANTS in the land"!
- WE ARE WELL ABLE TO OVERCOME IT = Caleb's words were words of faith that circumstances don't change the promise of God- he may have added, "the Lord didn't mention there were giants in the land, because it doesn't change his promise to give us the land"
- Caleb pictures the SPIRITUAL Christian who OVERCOMES by FAITH (1 John 5:4)
- By comparing (Deu 1:29-31), it seems Moses also spoke up at this time and tried to convince the people to have faith





- WE BE NOT ABLE (13:31)= the 10 spies picture CARNAL Christians who ARE OVERCOME by FEAR
- THE PEOPLE...ARE STRONGER THAN WE (13:31)= true, but not stronger than the Lord; they forgot the promise of (Exo 23:20-23; 33:2)
- Canaan (the Promised land) represents the VICTORIOUS Christian life, and most do not have the FAITH and the FIGHT to possess it, just like Israel
- The first time the word GIANTS appears in (13:33) it is translated from the Hebrew word Nephiyl (pl. Nephilim); this word only appears here and in (Gen 6:4)
- GIANTS were the mutant and hybrid offspring of fallen angels and women (Gen 6:2,4); regardless of how this reproduction was able to take place, the natural fact is that hybrids are STERILE (i.e.- mules)- there are only two ways their numbers can increase: (I) continuous CROSS-BREEDING; or (2) genetic engineering
- Since all the giants were killed in the Flood, there had to be at least one "extraterrestrial" invasion and cohabitation AFTER the Flood to account for all the giants cf. (Deu 2:10,12,20,23; 2 Sam 21:22)



- The second time the word GIANTS appears in (13:33) it is translated from the Hebrew word Gibbowr (pl. Gibborim); this word appears in (Gen 6:4) and is translated as MIGHTY
- The crying and unbelief at Kadesh-Barnea (14:1) is the tenth of 10x the children of Israel "tempt" the Lord cf. (14:22)
- The unfortunate sequence of events that transpires when troubles and trials confront the carnal: (1) they see reality from the perspective of their circumstances (13:28); (2) they walk by sight and not faith so their faith falters (13:31); (3) they cry in complaint and begin to murmur (14:1-2); (4) they accuse the Lord (14:3); and (5) they determine to go back into the world for relief (14:4)
- The Lord gave them this one last chance to repent, but they wanted to stone Joshua and Caleb (14:10)
- For the second time, the Lord threatens to disinherit Israel and make a great nation out of Moses; and for the second time, Moses intercedes for Israel (type of CHRIST) (14:11-19) cf. (Exo 32:9-14)
- The pardon spared the people but not the rebellious spies; it spared the people immediate death, but not all punishment (14:15,20,28-29,36-37)





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- The people had faith to apply the blood of the lamb and to EXIT Egypt (Exo 12), but they did not have faith to ENTER the Promised Land
- Kadesh-Barnea serves as an example (I Cor 10:3-6) and warning (Heb 3:7-19; 6:4-6) of the consequences of UNBELIEF, regardless of the legitimacy of one's profession- it will prevent the lost from having ETERNAL life (Rev 21:8), and the carnal Christian from having an ABUNDANT life (John 10:10)
- Those younger than 20 years old (i.e.- the "little ones" and "children"), as well as Joshua and Caleb, would still have to bear the sins of the people and wander in the wilderness for 40 years (i.e.- a year for each day the spies were in the land) until that generation was consumed (14:31-34)
- This illustrates the fact that the spiritual believer will still suffer negative consequences for the sins of the carnal believer and unbeliever, if all abide in the same "camp" (e.g.- a nation, a church, a family), because sin defiles the ENTIRE camp cf. (Jos 6:18)



- The people did not genuinely repent (14:40)- they were sorry only AFTER they heard of their punishment (2 Cor 7:10; Heb 12:17)
- AMALEK= type of the FLESH; defeats the child of God who presumes to fight the battle under his own power (Rom 7:18)
- The WILDERNESS is typical of the life of every Christian but it is the Lord's will that we JOURNEY through it, not WANDER
- The children of Israel JOURNEYED from Egypt (Exo 12:37), across the Red sea, and through the wilderness up to Kadesh-Barnea (Exo 16:1; 17:1; 40:36-38; Num 9:17-23; 10:2,6,12,28-29,33; 11:35; 12:15); but WANDERED in the wilderness until they returned to Kadesh 40 years later (15:1-20:22)
